Research Approach

- Decentralization Framework
- Who are the actors in the JVS?
- What powers do the different actors have?
- What are the accountability mechanisms that are in place (downwardly to the farmers)?









Findings

- No powers for the farmers – rules, decision, compliance
- Crop production + marketing decided by JVS partner
- Little benefits -BEE
- Legal case since 2010 for Setlaboswane





Findings

- No capacity building – long term sustainability
- Limited
 employment
 opportunities –
 technological
 'progress'





Findings

- Lack of accountability and transparency – LDA, JVS partner e.g. costs and income -
- Communities look for a new partner?
- Improper relationship LDA/JVS partner?





So What?

- Re-formulation of JVS.
- Subsidies must benefit the poor.
- Land fee irrespective.
- Compulsory capacity building LDA
- Sustainability capital costs replacement.
- Farmer 'ownership'
